JOHN SEWELL, from *Principle* only, and the love of order under the Government that has protected him 40 years, and his predecessors Brotherton's and Manship's, near a century before that time, entered his name, the 5th person, into the Association at the Crown-and-Anchor Tavern, in the Strand, † which has happily excited similar ones over the whole kingdom, by which the peaceable people have had an opportunity of quietly shewing their sentiments without fear of being injured by the fly Hand of *Sedition*, then growing to an alarming height, which, from his own observations in many parts of the country, in which his health obliged him to travel, he could not but observe with regret. Those Gentlemen put him on the committee, in which he has acted with the independence of a blunt Englishman, while at home he has lent part of his premises for the purpose of circulating the papers containing the sentiments of true-born Englishmen, as well as carried his point, in convincing the committee that a cheap neat octavo edition, † published periodically, will convince persons in general (the lower class in particular) of their error, who have been misinformed by the writings and insinuations of artful, seditious, and designing, men.

He recommends to the committee to employ persons of judgement and literary abilities to select, from the wonderful heap of correspondence already come, such as are fit to continue this publication, till it may form a volume; which will have the advantage of conveying the sentiments of one country to another in a concise, cheap, easy, and elegant manner, and remain to posterity a monument of the good sense of the present age, when the loose papers at first issued are gone into oblivion.

Proper offices will be appointed in a few days, when the present will be shut, the proprietor being desirous to retire to his own business, that of a publisher being no part of it.

Conscious that many of his best friends have had occasion to take exceptions at his conduct, in refusing to let these papers pass through his shop, as well as discouraging conversations on political topics: the latter has been the uniform custom ever since 1752, to his own knowledge, and he believes a century before, while it is free of access to all persons of business, insomuch as some have jocularly styled it "the *Appendix* to the coffee-houses near the spot."

To the Association, no other apology is necessary than one of its principle tenets, the *Liberty* of acting as he likes on his own premises, while those actions are within the protection of the law, under which he hopes to live to laugh and laugh while he lives.
